China's "24 solar terms" were added to UNESCO's world intangible cultural heritage list during the 11th session of UNESCO's Intergovernmental Committee for the Safeguarding of Intangible Cultural Heritage meeting.

sun's annual motion, as well as the deep understanding of the year's changes in season, climate and phenology. The "24 solar terms" guide traditional agricultural production and daily life. Neighbouring countries share in Chinese HSR opportunities

On the list of Yunnan's eighteen oddities, one item says that "trains go abroad but not inland". Strange as it may seem, this was the case when the Yunnan-Vietnam Railway went into operation in 1910.

Today, Yunnan is accessible by high-speed railways, which connect with the Yunnan-Vietnam Railway and in turn the China-Laos Railway, the China-Thailand Railway and the Pan-Asian (Kunming-Singapore) Railway. Such a web of tracks brings great opportunities for the economic development of neighbouring countries.

Many people in neighbouring countries are very concerned about the news that Yunnan will soon be accessible by high-speed rail. "Laos is close to Kunming. Soon we will be able to travel from Laos to many cities in China and enjoy the beautiful scenery along the way," a Lao journalist said. "The construction of the China-Laos Railway is now in full swing. Upon its completion, it will facilitate two countries' economic development."

To date, Yunnan Province has developed blueprints for constructing domestic sections of international railways. These include the China-Laos Railway, the China-Thailand Railway, the China-Myanmar Railway and the China-MyanmarIndia Railway. Inspiring progress has been made along the paths of the China-Laos Railway and the China-Thailand Railway. The Kunming-Yuxi section of China-Laos Railway has already entered its test phase. With the development of high-speed railways, Yunnan Province is being brought closer to South and Southeast Asian countries, as well as the Pacific and Indian oceans and China's coastal areas. With the implementation of the Belt and Road Initiative, the day is drawing closer and closer when Yunnan shares with its neighbouring the economic development opportunities brought by highspeed railways.

Yunnan fruits mostly exported to ASEAN countries

According to customs statistics, from January to October 2016, Yunnan has exported 592,000 tons of different kinds of fruits including dry and fresh fruits and nuts, an increase of 41.3% over the previous year. It earned RMB 9.33 billion, an increase of 23.9%, and it accounts for 36.9% of China's total, the top among all provinces and cities in China.

In terms of destination, Yunnan fruits are mostly exported to ASEAN countries. From January to October this year, fruits worth RMB 7.75 billion were exported from Yunnan to ASEAN countries. This is an increase of 16.2%, and accounts for 54.2% of China in total which is RMB 14.3 billion for the corresponding period.

Sydney - Kunming air route opened

Australian businessman's dream of flowers

The Australian merchant John Khalil plants flowers in Shuanghe Township, Jinning County, Yunnan Province. He hopes to plant more and better flowers to sell all over the

John Khalil, executive director of Lynch Group, the largest flower grower and wholesaler in Australia and the southern hemisphere, did not chose Jinning without good

Today, Yunnan's fresh cut flowers make up about 75 percent of the total domestic market. At Kunming's Dounan Flower Market, 70 percent of fresh cut flowers are produced in Jinning, which claims the title of "first among all Chinese towns in flowers."

In 2014, Lynch Group set up a fresh cut flower production base. It now exports between 200,000 to 300,000 plants to Australia on a weekly basis. Today, this supply still falls behind Australian.

John said that China holds and will maintan an important position in the company's development strategy. This is because, he says, "the favourable climate here is suitable
