The 12th China-South Asia Business Forum held in Kunming

On June 11-13, the 12th China-South Asia Business Forum was held in Yunnan's capital Kunming.
In the context of deglo-

balization, politicians and business leaders from China and South Asian countries, and representatives of the SAARC Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the UNESCAP Business Advisory Council, discussed how to jointly promote regional cooperation between China and South Asia, focusing on the theme "Challenging Opportunities-Job Creation and Investment Innovation". Compared with previous years, "China experience" has become a trendy phrase this year, attracting widespread attention from the business communities in South Asia.

Innovation based development should be a priority in the cooperation," said He Yafei, the former vice Foreign Minister and the former deputy director of the Overseas Chinese Affairs Office of the State Council. The 2017 South-Southeast Asia Commodity Expo and Investment Fair(SSA-CEIF) were held in Kunming, Yunnan province from June 12 to 18, attracting 86 countries and regions to take part.

Themed on "creating new opportunities and seeking new development", the expo is aimed at deepening the relationship between China and other countries in South and Southeast Asia.

Covering an area of 170,000 square meters, the expo is comprised of 17 exhibition pavilions with 8,000 exhibition booths. In addition to the standard themed pavilions, special pavilions have also been set up for Pakistan and Laos.

A total of 18 activities were held to accompany the expo, including the ASEAN Overseas Chinese Entrepreneurs Conference.

It is expected that nearly 300 projects will be signed during the week-long expo, of which more than one third will be worth above 1 billion yuan (\$147.12 million).

Yunnan hosts fifth annual think tank forum

The fifth China-South and Southeast Asia Think Tank Forum(CS-SATF) was held in Kunming on 12th and 13th of June.

More than 300 experts and scholars from 14 countries and some international organizations have attended this year's think tank forum, a record high in its history. The number of participating think tanks also increased, comprising more than 30 foreign and 40 domestic organizations.

The theme of the forum is deepening practical cooperation between China and South and Southeast Asian countries with new opportunities, new ideas and new

The think tank forum has been held four sessions so far and achieved concrete results. It has increased mutual trust between China and South and Southeast Asia countries. It has promoted facilities connectivity, unimpeded

trade, financial integration,

policy coordination, and people-to-people bond between China and South and Southeast Asia counties. It also promoted close cooperation and exchanges among the think-tanks.

It is notable that in September 2015, Yunnan government established the China (Kunming) South Asia Research Institute under the Yunnan Provincial Social Science Academy. The Institute is currently working to become one of the top think tanks in China.

In 2017 The name of "China-South Asia Think Tanks Forum" was changed to "China - South and Southeast Asia Think Tanks Forum" starting to further increase its influence.

Abide by cyber law to profit from market

The much-anticipated cyber security law that came into force on June 1 reflects China's determination to secure its cyberspace and protect Chinese citizens against data theft. Some Western observers, however, are worried that the new law targets foreign enterprises by "restricting the cross-border flow of information", which could "give Chinese companies an unfair advantage".

Such worries are uncalled for, as the ultimate aim of the new law is to safeguard China's cyberspace sovereignty and security.

The truth is, cyber security is a precondition for na-Xi Jinping has said. Xi has time and again emphasized the need to strike a balance between secure cyberspace and digital development, and ruled out the possibility of "shutting the door" to the internet for security con-

But some Western media outlets have made it a business to misread China's laws. The provision requiring key information on infrastructure operators' data should be especially protected as it is closely linked with national security. And it is necessary to conduct a security review to ensure their data systems do not compromise China's national security.

China aspires to become a digitally advanced country, which should be seen as a great opportunity by overseas internet operators and service providers, especially those in the possession of desired technologies or busi-

Also, since China has a long way to go to improve it could enlist the help of business pioneers at home and abroad. And foreign companies, like their domestic counterparts, can work with Chinese government to improve China's cyber governance.

Challenge 7: Playing Go game with Yunnan's precious chess pieces Yunzi

Google's artificial intelligence program AlphaGo competed against Ke Jie, the world's No 1 Go player from China recently and prevailed in all three games.

Do you know that the playing pieces used by AplhaGo and Ke Jie are from southwest China's Yunnan Province?

Yunzi is the name for the exquisite pieces made in Yunnan. The craft has a 500-year history. According to the records of Xu Xiake, a Chinese geologist in the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644),

Yunnan was described as the very place to produce chess pieces and Baoshan Yongchang's were the best.

The pieces are made from a blend of ten plus materials including red agate, amethyst and amber. Making Yunzi is a quite complex process and is a combination of craftsmanship and artistic beauty. The white ones should be as bright as egg white, the dark ones as green as jade.

In 2009, the craft of making Yunzi has been listed as the provincial intangible cultural heritage in Yunnan.

Last October, Yongzi Chess Club opened in the Longyang District of Baoshan City. The Club integrates Yongzi historic and culture displays, chess training, and chess competitions. Do you dare to come for a challenge?

Ctars work at sunrise and Ostops work at sunset., which is a typical work day routine for a Miao girl named Xiong Zhaomei. "Very few young people like to work on batik because the income is not good and it is boring, Xiong Zhaomei, a 90's Miao girl said. She was born in a batik family so she has a strong interest and deep sense of responsibility for batik. "I don't want excellent batik art to disappear."

Xiong Zhaomei said that she started to learn batik-making when she was ten years old. She is now the seventh generation of batik-maker in the family. While batik skills have



been improving, she has also witnessed the decline of batik, the traditional art of her hometown in her own generation.

We all want to go out to see the world and are not able to get down." Xiong Zhaomei said that fewer and fewer people are

Xiong Zhomei is not undismayed. She is still working to encourage people to accept this art and has found new ways of expanding batik use. "In my grandmother's day, batik was only used for clothing they wore every day. But now we are making batik art into tourism souvenirs and integrating this intangible heritage into modern life." Wallets, Qipaos, scarves.....these modern products are not only welcomed by consumers, but also enable the intangible heritage to be carried forward in an innovative way.

Intangible heritage represents tradition and the 90's generation represents innovation. "We want to show folk customs and intangible heritage through modern art." She explained, "Intangible heritage preservation cannot be done without young people."
