Xi's 'shared future' now a consensus

Chinese President Xi Jinping's vision of building a community with a shared future for mankind has become an important international consensus echoed by many countries, organizations and political parties in the past year, according to international relations analysts.

As political leaders including US President Donald Trump are meeting in Davos, Switzerland, to discuss the future of the global economy and politics this week, the proposals raised by Xi during his Swiss trip a year ago remain a positive force to improve global governance

systems, analysts said. Xi said that by building a community with a shared future for mankind, people's lives around the world can be improved, a view that still enlightens political and business leaders at this year's meeting.

On Jan 18, 2017, Xi made a keynote speech at the United Nations Office in Geneva titled *Work Together* to Build a Community with a Shared Future for Mankind, offering China's solutions to cope with global challenges.

"Building a community with a shared future is an exciting goal, and it requires efforts from generation after generation," Xi said. "China is ready to work with all the other UN member states as well as international organizations and agencies to advance the great cause of building a community with a shared future for mankind."

The president's speech drew strong and positive feedback from the international community. A month later, the Chinese concept of building "a human community with shared destiny" was incorporated into a UN resolution for the first time at the 55th UN Commission for Social Development on Feb 11.

The US\$218 million Nam Phay hydropower project in the Lao province of Xaysomboun was officially put into operaion on January 22.

He added the project will generate revenue, create jobs and enhance the livelihood of people living nearby.

Yunnan to focus on clean energy, green food and tourism

"Yunnan will strive to develop the world's first-class 'clean energy' and 'green food' industries, and aims to be a world-class 'destination for healthy life'. These are the three aces for Yunnan to play."

At the opening of the First Session of the 13th Yunnan Provincial People's Congress on January 25, the government work report outlined three ace industries Yunnan will focus on in the coming years. Each of the industries will reach a production value of hundreds of billions yuan.

In the ensuing week, the phrase "three aces" was heatedly debated by deputies of the First Session of the 13th Yunnan Provincial People's Congress, as well as by members of the First Session of the 12th Yunnan Provincial Committee of the CPPCC.

Ding Xingzhong, director of Yunnan Provincial Bureau of Energy, said clean energy will make up 42 percent of the province's energy total by 2020, with an installed capacity of 93 million kilowatts.

"Yunnan's annual production capacity of new energy vehicles will reach 500,000, with 350 charge stations and 163,000 posts to be built across the province," added Yang Fusheng, director of Yunnan Provincial Industry and Information Technology Commission.

Wang Minzheng, director of Yunnan Provincial Department of Agriculture, specified the green food varieties involve tea, flowers, vegetables, TCM herbs, walnuts, fruit, coffee, edible fungus, and meat.

Yu Fan, director of Yunnan Provincial Tourism Development Commission, noted the province will continue to clean up tourism market with "zero tolerance". And based on the App of "Tour in Yunnan on the phone", Yunnan will develop smart tourism, offering easy and sound service to tourists.

"In the coming five to ten years, Yunnan plans to build up an international health and medicine town, which will serve as a world-class destination for healthy life and medical tourism." Li Malin, director of Yunnan Health and Family Planning Commission, said.

Chinese consulate-general in Luang Prabang holds reception

The Consulate-General of the People's Republic of China in Luang Prabang held a Spring Festival, or Chinese lunar new year, reception on January 25.

"At present, China is Lao's second largest trading partner. From January to November 2017, the bilateral trade volume between China and Laos reached 2.6 billion U. dollars, up 27 percent over the same period last year," Chinese consul-general to Luang Prabang Li Baoguang said at the reception. Noting the friendly ties between the two countries, Li said that China has helped build quite a few hydropower projects, hospitals, highways and schools in Laos, with the goal of increasing the wellbeing of local people.

Since the project first got underway in December 2013, the involved Chinese companies have meticulously organized their efforts. A 72hour trial operation finished in May 2017, and the entire project was cleared for operations June 20, 2017.
